## What?

- → A broad, interdisciplinary overview of many crucial Arctic topics, combining the history and development of the region with a modern perspective on today's Arctic societies.
- → We start by looking at *climate change, archaeology, microbiology and geology*, before moving on to learn about *sustainable development, the politics of independence, modern history, security and international relations*.
- → With a small class size, the course involves plenty of debate and discussion on how the topics are interlinked, with teaching from over 15 experts from every discipline.
